Learning Objectives	Design and create a weather map InspirEd by 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory'.
Materials	BIC KIDS Visacolor XL felt tip pens A3 paper, scissors, glue and Blu tac. Tissue paper, coloured paper, glitter, cardboard.
Teacher Prep	
Print out the worksheet. One per group. Please read the book, 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory'. Prepare a YouTube clip of 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory' for the children to watch. It must show the inside of the factory. You may also wish to show a clip from 'Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs'. Find a map of the UK with large cities marked on it.	Pupil Prep

Lesson	
<p>Worksheet 1</p> <p>Task 1 - Put the pupils in groups of 3 and show them the prepared map. The map of the UK needs filling in. Ask the children to draw the borders of England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. Then ask them to locate and write the names of at least 3 Cities. Advanced difficulty - Add 3 major rivers, a historical monument and the town/city where they live.</p> <p>Task 2 - Screen the YouTube clips. Ask the pupils to think of imaginative names for other places and then write them on their map. The names should be inspired by events, food and rooms in Willy Wonka's factory. What would Willy Wonka name a place if he could? Marshmallow Mountain, Oompa-Loompa Gorge?</p> <p>Activity 1 Using the plan as a reference, each group should make a larger map on A3 paper. Make it bright and colourful using BIC KIDS Visacolor XL felt tip pens and write the place names in black to make sure they stand out. Get creative with your art supplies and decorate different places and landmarks with glitter and card.</p> <p>Activity 2 Ask the children to think of different types of food weather, for example a spaghetti tornado and chocolate rain. Draw, decorate and cut out each symbol ready to be used in the presentation. Use blu tac on the back to make them stick to the map. They need to be large enough to see from the back of the class. There are examples on the worksheet for them to copy if needed.</p> <p>Presentation Ask the pupils to present the map to the rest of the class. They must demonstrate how their weather symbols work and what inspired the places and names.</p>	
Learning Outcomes	Know the geography of the UK relative to it's borders and major cities. Use a well know piece of literature to inspire new ideas in a different subject. The pupils will have created a plan and then used it to improve their work. Improved teamwork skills Improved presentation skills
Follow on Activities	Invite InspirEd Workshops into your school to help film and edit the weather reports. Design a pirate map with buried treasure. Write clues to help people find the 'booty'. Do the lesson again with a different country or continent. Make a 'Wind in the Willow's' inspired map.
